



NDSCCC - Members Story - Part 2 Continued from August. By David Vogler




BIG BOAT, LITTLE CAR.

May 9. Disembarking from the overnight ferry into morning rush hour traffic in Palermo was a mistake. They come at you from all angles...Ridiculous. We are in Sicily however and 4–5 miles out of town on our way to Cefalu, things did improve a great deal and the rain stopped as well. We found our way to our superb B&B ready for a 2 nighter.

May 10. Car gets a rest today. Tourist things to do like coffee and cake, visit to the Duomo, cake and coffee, gawping at the views, wine and nibbles, shopping etc., etc. Excellent dinner overlooking the sea with wonderful sunset, just the two of us, very romantic. And, as we were eating ...the noise of a sweet 6 cylinder – An Alfa 2600 cabrio from the 60's...nice! Cefalu is smashing and well worth a visit. We would use this B&B again as well.

May 11. Packing the car and I can hear high performance engines. I see glimpses of Ferrari, Porsche, even a Volvo Amazon... The tail end of the Targa Florio!! Once packed and say 'cheerio' to the B&B, we start on our way along the north coast when we are caught up in a convoy of classics. Jags, Alfas, a little Peugeot van and the noisiest, alloy bodied Delahaye from the 30's...GREATSTUFF! Our road turns away from the coast and starts to climb.

Stunning views of mountains and twisty roads, just what we came for. We have plenty of time but we are held up a little by a 4x4 with the driver leaning out of the window leading 5 horses to his farm and then by a herd of cows being driven along the road...big ones...with horns... big horns! Brilliant day with excellent weather and quiet roads. We get to our accommodation in Ponta Secca with time for drinks... Nice. (This is where TV show 'Inspector Montalbano' is filmed.). Sleepy little place and a two night stop so quiet time tomorrow. (May 12.)

May 13. Rained last night and the car is covered with white dust from the Sahara. Driving to Taormina today so quick window clean and off. We follow local cars because of the puddles are covering potholes. Even Italians are worried about the damage caused by bad road surfaces. We followed a UK registered 1920s tourer for a while...not sure but a Sunbeam maybe...had a nice deep exhaust rumble though. I also spotted a Zoe yellow Alfa Romeo 4C parked up...Good taste these Italians. Lovely trip along the coast with some great glimpses of the volcano and some pretty villages. Got to the B&B but parking is a nightmare and the roads are very steep. Had to park in a secure site but up some nasty stone steps to the room. Evening meal with roving minstrels as entertainment, all very Sicilian but Taormina is very touristy compared to our last stop.

May 14. Off to Messina after a lazy morning in town, drinking coffee and seeing the sites. The car is manky so we found a carwash and blasted the desert from all the nooks and crannies. Very pleasant roads along the coast with stunning views along the way. The apartment in Messina doesn't have parking but we got in just opposite. Good long walk before dinner, early start tomorrow for ferry back to the mainland.

May15. Ferry to mainland boarded at 09:10 and arrived mainland 20 mins later! Along the coast, north, towards Diamonte. Quick supermarket stop for essentials...(wine and snacks) and dropped the hood to top up the tan. Minimal traffic and good roads. Very pleasant couple of hours to our 2 night stop at a very new hotel.

May 16. Huge storm overnight. The place got a battering but rain stopped after breakfast so stroll into the town. Very few tourists but the place is known for its murals. I check the car ready for tomorrow and we get dinner. Nice place to visit, shame about the rainstorm.

May 17. Hell of a storm again last night. Termoli today and on to coast roads for a while then we swing into the mountains to cross to the Adriatic. Some of the best mountain views this trip but then the heavens opened up again. 1 1/2 hours later we stopped for a coffee and a bun and watched the sun come out. Hood down and we motored on good roads with minimal traffic and not to many potholes. Heaps to see in the mountains including more golden ea-gles but the views are stunning. Termoli is a nice town with resort beach, castle and good shops. Pizza and a beer were very welcome.

May 18. Wake up to good weather and it's off to Rimini. We've been warned that some roads are closed due to flooding and we now know that the rain storms are the ones hitting central Italy. The coast roads are very slow so we try the highway. The passable roads are very busy and the trip takes twice as long as it should. The sun is out so seeing so much disruption is a little confusing but we get into Rimini by late afternoon. We have good weather, sunshine and warmth so we enjoy a stroll, a glass of wine and do some window shopping. Evening dinner and more walking through a very pleasant resort.

May 19. A nice place to be with an old town to explore. Relaxing ready for a big run to Bardolino tomorrow.

May 20. We start the day with rain again obscuring the views in the mountains.

Then we come across the flooded areas. One village we came to, the waters had dropped and the people were bringing buckets of mud out of the houses. All their possessions were at the side of the road waiting for the authorities to collect and scrap. The nearby river levels had dropped but the damage had been done. Poor people. The police diverted the traffic a couple of miles further on and we ended up on the highway. Not what we planned but our plans paled into insignificance after seeing the plight of farmers and vineyard owners with their livelihoods swept away.

We arrived in Bardolino in good weather after a very quiet trip. Time to rest.

May 21–24. We are in our happy place. Bardolino is such a pleasant town to stay. We walk, use the lake boats, tour the lakeside towns...yes... posing in the car with the hood down, visit Val-policella to get some Rippasso, and basically, enjoy our holiday.

May 25. We leave today and are heading towards Susa at the foot of the Alps. (Susa is twined with Barnstaple). We have a fair way to go so we hit the highway. Top down most of the way but we got some rain just past Turin. We came off the motorway and found Susa easily. Nice place with some interesting historical sites. We did find a restaurant called Cantine Meana.

Three courses, excellent quality, well cooked food, bottle of water and ½ litre of good, red or white wine....euro 14 per person....the place was full of locals as you can imagine and had a brilliant atmosphere. A real find.

May 26. Long day planned today trying to get to Bourges but over the Alps via Le Petite St Bernard pass. Brilliant weather and breath-taking views. Again, twisty turning mountain roads, ideal for the Spider and worth the trip.

The roads go from mountain passes to open planes and towns to very boring motorway. We wanted to get to Bourges though and paid the price. Overnight in basic accommodation but ready for a trip to the zoo tomorrow.

May 27. A day at the zoo to see 4 giant pandas at Beauval...not planned but worth it. On to Tours via quiet A roads.

May 28. From overnight in Tours, we make our way to Bayeux via nice A roads through pleasant countryside. We have passed the D Day beaches several times so we made the effort to visit this time. The commonwealth memorial, built not so long ago, is thought provoking and beautiful at the same time. Worth the time.

Into Bayeux and hotel overnight. Visit to the cathedral and other, very pretty sites in the town. Evening meal next to a very nice family from South Carolina 'doing Europe'.

May 29. After breakfast we visited the commonwealth war graves site in the heart of Bayeux. Another 'must see' beautifully kept memorial.

Onwards towards Cherbourg, late lunch in the town onto the ferry and home.

A wonderful trip with the car not missing a beat. I did see the mileage click over 100, 101 and 102 thousand miles however, but we covered 4,484 miles over the month. We haven't planned another trip like this one yet but Sardinia has been mentioned!





